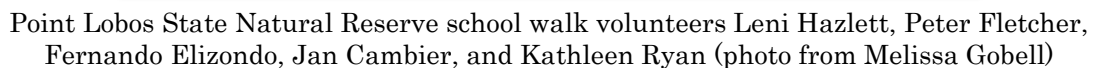
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2019 ACTIVITY REPORT VOLUNTEERS IN PARKS PROGRAM

Summary

Volunteers are vital partners supporting the operation of California State Parks. Without the passionate and dedicated service of volunteers in the Volunteers in Parks Program (VIPP) supporting critical functions, State Parks would not be able to successfully execute its mission.

In 2019, **43,333 volunteers** provided a total of **1,138,528 service hours**, surpassing the 1 million-hour benchmark for the 11th consecutive year. These hours represent an equivalent value of nearly **\$35.9 million*** to California State Parks. Volunteers enabled the state parks to enhance outreach and community engagement activities, services to visitors, public safety, and the stewardship of our natural and cultural resources.

A whopping 81% of volunteers—**35,234 individuals**—participated as short-term volunteers (three days or less), while **8,099** people made long-term volunteer commitments. This is a decrease of just over 2% of total volunteers both long-term and short-term over 2018.

Although the total number of volunteers has decreased, each volunteer's **average number of hours contributed was 26.3 hours, a 3% increase**. This is one indicator that California State Parks' volunteers are a dedicated group of outstanding individuals willing to step up and support state parks throughout California.

Interpretation continued to represent the largest category of volunteer service, comprising 29% of all volunteer hours. Combined, hours donated working as campground hosts and public contacts, as well as performing maintenance/housekeeping tasks, account for 38% of total volunteer hours.

Staff Support and Training

In 2019, every State Parks staff hour invested in the **Volunteers in Parks Program** yielded nearly five hours of volunteer service. The total number of staff involved in the program reached a five-year low of 518 with 108,078 staff-support hours, averaging 208 hours per staff person, which is a drop of 43% of volunteer coordination hours from 2018.

A total of 38 staff involved with coordinating and managing volunteers attended one of the two Volunteer Coordination trainings offered in March and September 2019. This training was designed for staff new to volunteer coordination and as a refresher for veteran coordinators. The course included basic background knowledge such as legal issues, as well as human rights, accessibility, and State Parks policies affecting volunteers. There were also segments on volunteer registration, public safety, utilizing social media, risk management, creating a more diverse volunteer program, and working with cooperating associations.

Volunteer Recognition

California State Parks offers two types of awards to recognize a volunteer's cumulative contributions to parks. Poppy Awards are bestowed by district superintendents on volunteers who have contributed significantly to the betterment of California State Parks. The Volunteer Medallion Award is State Parks' highest volunteer honor and is awarded to volunteers who have made a significant contribution to the mission and goals of State Parks over the years.

State Parks staff presented 71 Poppy Awards and 25 Volunteer Medallions to outstanding volunteers meriting statewide recognition during 2019. This was a slight decrease in awards from the previous year.

Additionally, nearly 3,100 volunteers earned district passes and over 2,200 volunteers contributed 200 hours or more in 2019, thereby earning a statewide park pass providing free day-use access to parks as a gesture of gratitude for their service.

Volunteer Program Highlights

Throughout the state, volunteers continued to support parks through their work in visitor centers and museums; leading tours and hikes; running campfire and Junior Ranger programs; devoting hours to research; providing information to park visitors from around the world; monitoring local wildlife populations; interpreting history; maintaining grounds, gardens, beaches, and trails; helping campers; and so much more!

While there were many highlights in the Volunteers in Parks Program in 2019, there are three that are especially notable:

- In October, Point Sur State Historic Park (SHP) opened the Point Sur Naval Facility for public tours for the first time since the State acquired the property nearly 20 years ago. The opening of this portion of the park was made possible due to the hard work of the park's volunteers, and from October-December, nearly 500 visitors took tours of the Facility.

- Raintown 1897 SHP's Polar Express Event received the highest score of any Polar Express Event in North America. This annual event which brings to life Chris Van Allsburg's children's book, *The Polar Express*, is put on, primarily, by the park's volunteers.

- Pigeon Point Light Station SHP was able to open historic buildings on the lighthouse grounds for tours for the first time in nearly 20 years, and 240 visitors took docent-led tours in the last five months of the year. On top of that, the lighthouse's 147th anniversary celebration brought a crowd of over 2,500 visitors to the park in a single day to participate in a great variety of docent-hosted activities. Volunteers look forward to completion of the project that will restore the lighthouse tower.

Program

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Although it would be impossible to include all of the other contributions volunteers made to our parks in 2019, here is a small sampling of the highlights:

Interpretation

- At Point Lobos State Natural Reserve (SNR), the [Easy Access Adventure Program](#) continued to allow visitors of all abilities to experience the park. Approximately 3,800 visitors were served at Easy Access events in 2019.
- Old Town San Diego SHP's volunteers donated a total of 15,852 hours and put on over 216 living history activities and events, including events that brought 7,500 school-aged children to the park throughout the year.
- Año Nuevo State Park (SP), docents provided 15,517 hours of interpretation to their visitors during their 3.5 month winter season as they lead groups of visitors and school children into the preserve to see the elephant seals.
- Burleigh Murray Ranch Park Property was able to offer a [First Day Hike](#) to the surrounding community thanks to the initiative and leadership of park docent, Ginny C., who planned the hike. This was one of more than 80 First Day Hikes offered at state parks, statewide, on January 1.
- Costumed volunteers brought history to life as they interacted with and inspired park visitors at dozens of historic parks.

Visitor Services

- 67 visitor center volunteers contributed over 5,000 hours and interacted with over 150,000 visitors at Anza-Borrego Desert SP, a 50% increase in visitors over 2018 due to the super bloom.

- Old Town San Diego SHP was one of five state parks that were awarded a 2019 Earth Day Grant from the California State Parks Foundation (CSPF), and had more than 500 visitors come out for their Earth Day event that featured many volunteer-led activities.
- Seacliff State Beach's (SB) landmark "Cement Ship" celebrated its 100th birthday in 2019, and volunteers spent the first Saturday of the summer season helping to put on a centennial celebration, which saw 381 visitors (about three times the typical summer day's number) come to the park's visitor center.
- Dedicated camp hosts throughout the state answered questions, held campfire programs, sold firewood, assisted with campground maintenance, and so much more to make camping in state parks a positive and memorable experience for thousands of visitors. Some of 2019's camp host highlights included:
 - Standish-Hickey State Recreation Area (SRA) camp host, Sindee Charlton, provided outstanding service to the park's visitors and staff, and her quick thinking and actions during a structure fire in June, 2019 prevented a possible catastrophe.
 - Portola Redwoods SP camp host Mike consistently went above and beyond by helping with maintenance projects, delivering firewood to campers, and helping in the kiosk when staffing was short
 - 24 camp hosts at Pfeiffer Big Sur SP contributed an outstanding 10,982 hours of service in 2019.
 - First-time Westport-Union Landing SB hosts, Tom and Suki Gray quickly became irreplaceable through their outstanding service to the park, which included Tom replacing a message board and campground sign.

Facility Maintenance

- The Monterey District Trails Program hosted their 8th annual Sierra Club trail work week during which Sierra Club volunteers from throughout the country worked in Julia Pfeiffer Burns SP to repair the Ewoldsen Trail which was severely damaged in recent years by wildfire and winter storms. Thanks to their hard work, the trail has been reopened to the public after being closed for almost three years.
- Big Basin Redwood SP's Volunteer Trail Crew celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2019, and put in a record number of 1,351 hours of service to improve and maintain the park's trails.
- Pigeon Point Light Station SHP docents built two new benches and additional display cases for new interpretive objects.
- At Point Lobos SNR, docents renovated the Information Station and Pelt Shed which also serves as a Visitor Center. The Pelt Shed was constructed by a skilled docent carpenter and much of the construction was able to be completed using reclaimed wood.

Cultural Stewardship

- Colorado Desert District Archaeology Volunteers organized the records of a past archeologist to add to the district's knowledge base and continued to work on re-inventorying their collections.
- At Anza-Borrego Desert SP, the Paleontology Program Volunteers discovered 33 new localities, which were recorded to the park's database, and completed the Rock Mammoth excavation. A group of five Paleontology Volunteers photographed, scanned, and processed imagery to produce 3D representations which can be printed and used for demonstrations to school groups, tours, and lectures.
- At Antelope Valley Indian Museum SHP, a group of archaeology students and faculty from Antelope Valley College volunteered their time cataloging hundreds of objects in the museum's collection.

Natural Stewardship

- Volunteer Carrie Durkee almost completely eradicated the invasive pampas grass from Navarro Beach in Navarro River Redwoods SP.

- Half Moon Bay SB combined their Coastal Wildflower Day with the CSPF's annual Earth Day Festival, and welcomed around 1,000 visitors to the park that day. Volunteers helped to plan the event and on the day of the festival, led wildflower and bird walks, children's activities, native plant information and sales, and worked on habitat restoration projects.
- Natural Resource volunteers from Mendocino Sector parks spent many hours removing invasive species from the Caspar Headlands every month, and have been stewarding the land for 20 years now.
- The Mendocino Mermaids (a local nonprofit organization) organized several volunteer beach clean ups at Big River Beach in Mendocino Headlands SP. Throughout the year, they removed over 126 pounds of garbage from beaches.

- At Fort Ross SHP and Sonoma Coast SP, sea lion surveyors collected and recorded data on the local sea lion population which is used to safeguard the continued existence of harbor seals on the Sonoma Coast.

Education

- La Purisima Mission SHP docents staffed 11 Student Living History Days which served around 900 visitors including approximately 800 4th graders.
- The school walks program at Point Lobos SNR saw a five-year high in the number of students they were able to serve. In 2019, docents led a total of 72 school walks, serving 3,183 students, over half of which were given to students from Title 1 schools.
- In the Santa Cruz District, both Rancho del Oso (a unit of Big Basin Redwoods SP) and Castle Rock SP were able to support field trips from Title I schools through the Kids2Park program. Rancho del Oso hosted 9 Kids2Park field trips, and Castle Rock SP volunteers co-led 94 hours of Kids2Parks field trips.
- Thanks to docents stepping in to help with student tours at Bean Hollow SB, 2019 saw a 25% increase in the number of students it was able to reach for a total of 250 students that participated in 2019 tours.

- Each summer, Santa Cruz Mission SHP offers weekly junior ranger programs, which often have local children who consistently participate. In 2019, three of the long-time junior rangers who “aged out” from the program the previous year returned to the park for the summer as volunteers for the junior ranger program, inspiring young visitors as they lead them in games and other activities.

Safety

- Volunteers at the Boucher Hill fire lookout in Palomar Mountain SP made 81 smoke reports and interacted with over 10,600 visitors providing tours of the tower and interpreting the history of fire lookouts.
- Oceano Dunes State Vehicular Recreation Area Off Highway Vehicle and Mounted Volunteer Patrol volunteers spent their weekends and holidays lending extra support to law enforcement by assisting with traffic control and acting as an extra set of eyes on trails and areas in the park that are not easily accessible by patrol vehicles.

- Countless other state park volunteers patrolled beaches, trails, and Off Highway Vehicle areas on horseback, bike, and by foot to support local law enforcement and provide helpful safety information to park visitors.

Miscellaneous

- Asilomar SB and Conference Grounds tour docent, Bryndie Beach, collaborated with a Monterey Peninsula College Landscape design class to give students the opportunity to create landscape design for an area of the park.
- Volunteers were featured in various publications throughout the year, including Old Town San Diego SHP's fiber artist, Susan Hector, who was featured in *Fibre Focus* and Old Town San Diego SHP's blacksmith Beth Holmberg, who was featured in a San Diego Union Tribune's *Someone San Diego Should Know* article.
- Volunteers created and/or contributed to their parks' newsletters. Publications such as Railtown 1897 SHP's *The Turntable*, Columbia SHP's *Streets of Columbia*, and Half Moon Bay SB's *Dunes Dispatch* helped to keep volunteers (and staff) informed and educated of happenings in the park and historical information relevant to the park's interpretation.
- Volunteers were celebrated and honored at dozens of volunteer appreciation events that took place across the state throughout the year.

VIPP Operational Improvements

2019 also saw the continued roll out of California State Parks' statewide volunteer management database, using Better Impact's Volunteer Impact software. The software was acquired in 2018, based on the Transformation Team's identification of the need for a single volunteer management database to replace the various volunteer management programs and methods being used in parks previously.

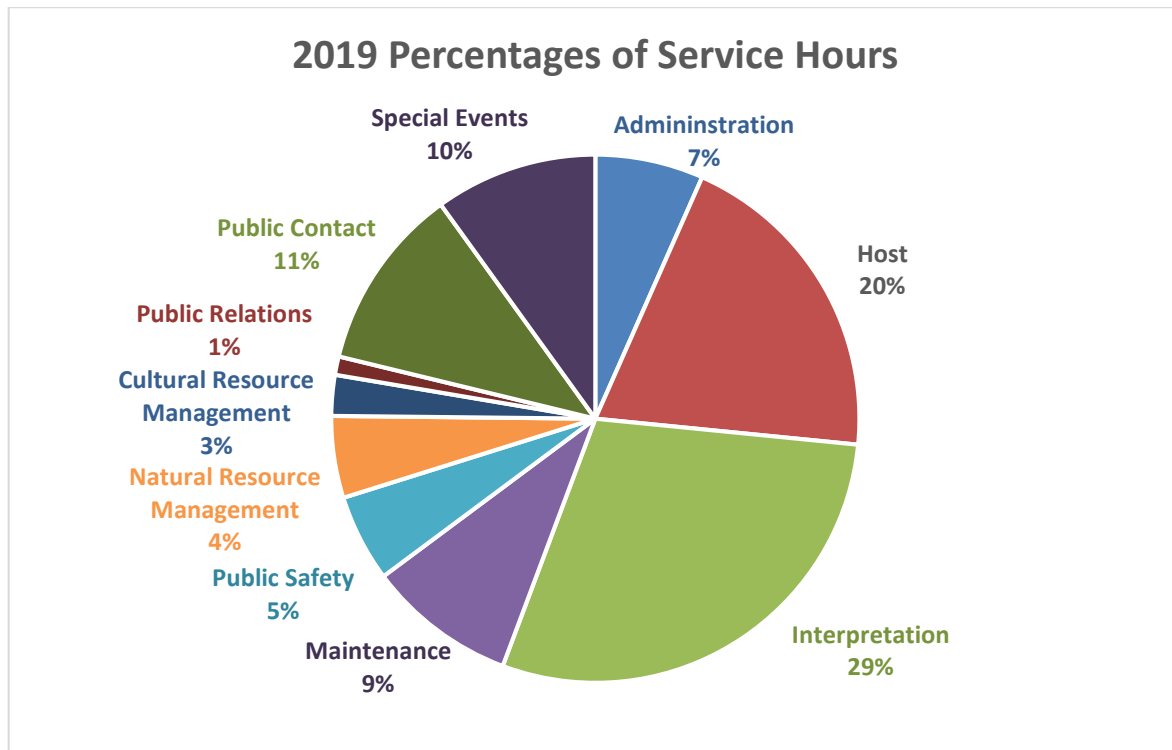
Parks are now using this database to track their volunteers' activities and hours, run reports to capture their volunteers' activity data, and to communicate with their volunteers.

It is expected that a majority of parks will fully implement Better Impact in all of their volunteer programs by the end of 2020, and that all 2020 VIPP hours will be logged in the database.

The database is helping to streamline volunteer coordination and management in the field, provide real-time information, and improve data collection on volunteers and their contributions.

In 2019, the VIPP also created a statewide volunteer coordinator and resource roster. The roster contains the names and contact information for each park's volunteer coordinators as well as the names of contacts at headquarters who can assist coordinators with various aspects of their volunteer program. This roster is regularly updated and e-mailed to volunteer coordinators, statewide.

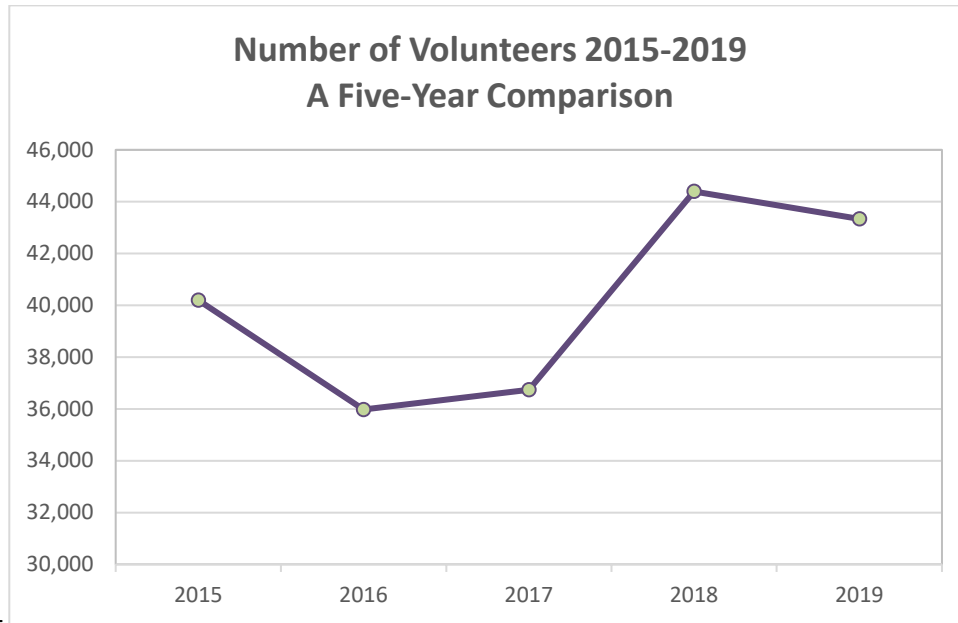

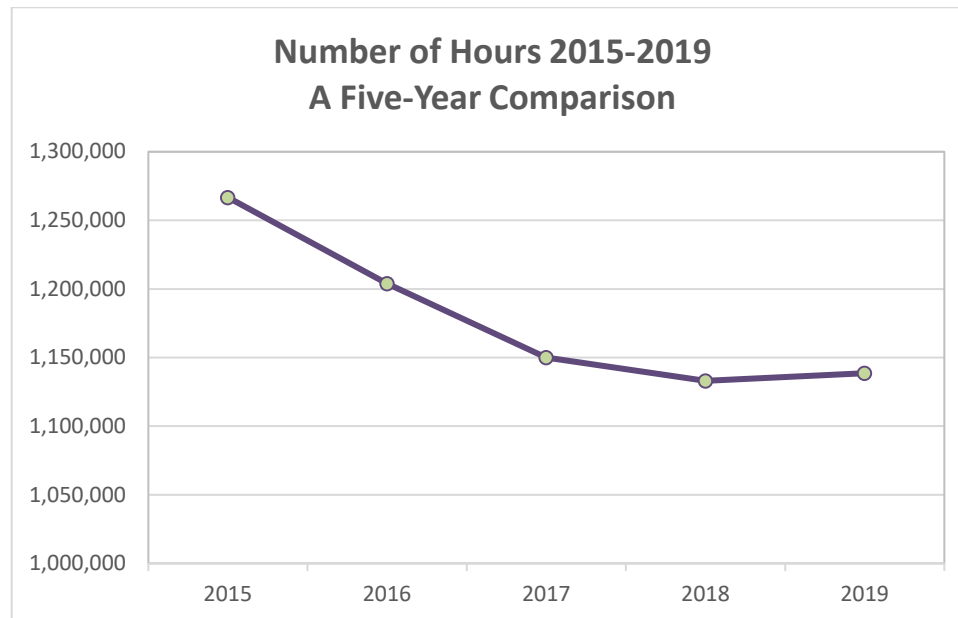
